Hal Cato, André Prince, Harold Love Jr., and Linda Eskind Rebrovick inducted into Public Schools Hall of Fame

Director of Schools Dr. Adrienne Battle calls on community to continue to come together in support of Nashville's public schools

NASHVILLE, TENN. – Sept. 27, 2023 – Today, the <u>Nashville Public Education Foundation</u> (NPEF) hosted its annual Public Schools Hall of Fame luncheon to honor trailblazing alumni from Metro Nashville Public Schools (MNPS), alongside visionary leaders and educators who are making a difference every day for the city's students. Nine exceptional honorees, comprising seven extraordinary individuals and two groundbreaking organizations, were recognized at the Hall of Fame because of their dedication to better student outcomes and empowering teachers, families, and students across Nashville's public schools.

Additionally, the event served as the first opportunity for newly elected *Mayor Freddie O'Connell* to share his vision for Nashville's students, families, and teachers. And, Director of Schools, Dr. Adrienne Battle reiterated the progress the district has shown over the past few years, including being named a Level 5 district – the highest possible rating – in the state accountability system for two years in a row.

"We are very proud of the progress we have made in Metro Schools thanks to the dedication of our amazing teachers, staff, families, and students," said **Dr. Adrienne Battle, MNPS Director of Schools.** "It is crucial to have strong community partners to support our work, and the Nashville Public Education Foundation is great at lifting up our best and brightest. I'm so happy to see several of our educators, graduates, and community partners being honored for their work, their accomplishments, and everything they represent."

Presented by First Horizon Foundation for the sixth consecutive year, the event took place at the Music City Center and was attended by nearly 700 people including Mayor O'Connell, Dr. Battle, Metro Council Members, Tennessee legislators, School Board Members, parents, educators, and community and business leaders.

"Each year, the Hall of Fame serves as an occasion to celebrate progress and recognize individuals and organizations who tirelessly strive to enhance learning experiences and student achievement in our public schools," said *Katie Cour, Nashville Public Education Foundation President & CEO*. "Our goal is to ensure every child can thrive in our city's public schools and we are proud that the Hall of Fame has evolved into an important platform, not only for recognizing impactful figures and organizations, but also for raising vital issues and sparking conversations that ignite change."
