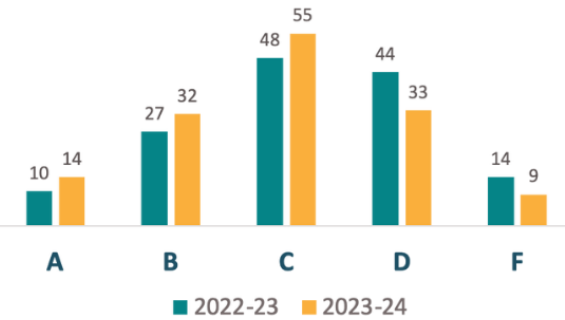


Update: MNPS's 2023-24 A-F Accountability Ratings

In December, the state released the second year of A-F accountability ratings for each district and school. Read on to learn what the latest findings tell us about MNPS and to understand more about our accountability system.

This past year, MNPS saw an increase in schools receiving A, B, and C ratings and a decrease in schools receiving D and F ratings

Promotes transparency and provides a consistent way to evaluate performance

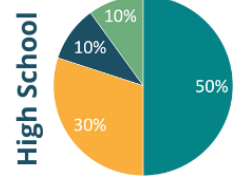
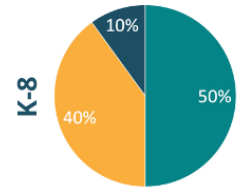


Identifies areas for improvement and helps to align resource allocation



Provides disaggregated data about student subgroups and ensures focus on all students

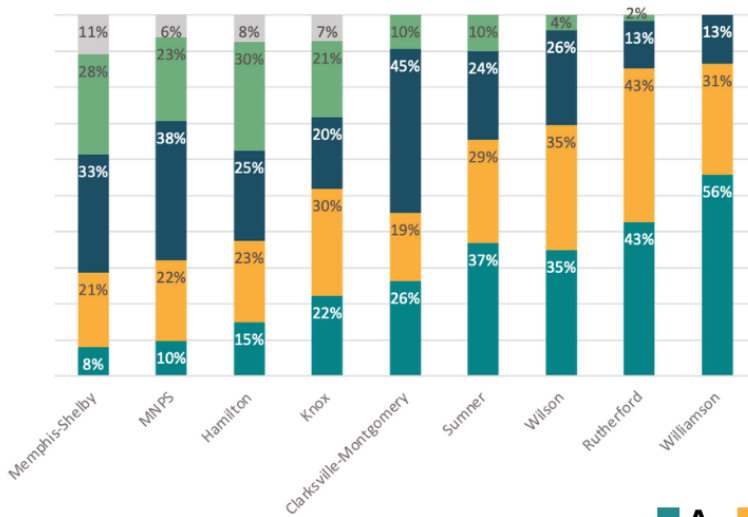
A-F Indicators



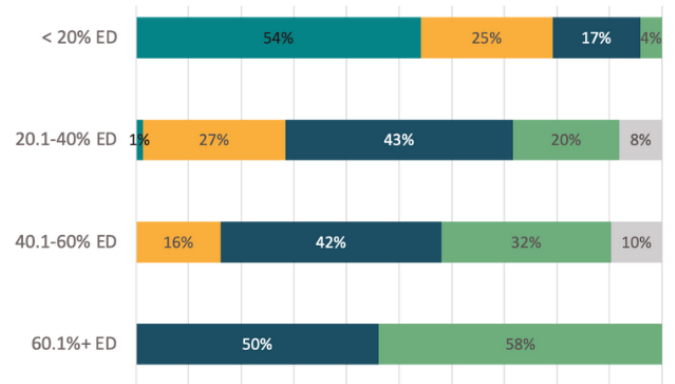
■ Student Achievement

Poverty and A-F ratings are highly correlated; districts and schools with higher percentages of economically disadvantaged students have more D or F schools and fewer A or B schools

While A-F systems are correlated with poverty, several schools in MNPS that serve high percentages of economically disadvantaged students saw significant growth, bringing their A-F ratings up
