What are academic standards?

What students should know and be able to do across subjects and grade levels - the End Goal

Example of a 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Math Standard

Tell and write time to the nearest minute

Standards are different from the curriculum, which is the day-to-day lessons and activities that a teacher employs to help students meet the standards

Students label parts of a paper clock and practice moving the hands to specific times

Students play a matching game to compare analog and digital clock times

### How does the State of Tennessee review and approve standards?

The State Board of Education reviews and approves standards in English/Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies at least every 6 years

## Why are academic standards so important?

In 2007, Tennessee received an Fin "Truth in Advertising" about student proficiency from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce



In 2008, the state launched the Tennessee Diploma Project that set higher expectations for students

in 2013, Tennessee is named the fastestimproving state on the national NAEP assessment
