Nashville Public Education Foundation Inducts Nine New Honorees into Public Schools Hall of Fame

21st Hall of Fame event the first with Diarese George, Ed.D as Foundation's new President and CEO

NASHVILLE, TENN. – Sept. 30, 2025 – Today, the Nashville Public Education Foundation (NPEF) celebrated its 21st Public Schools Hall of Fame luncheon by honoring Metro Nashville Public Schools (MNPS) alumni, visionary leaders, and educators who have made a lasting impact on Nashville's students and families. Nine remarkable honorees were inducted, including Janet Miller, Martesha Johnson Moore, Marlene Eskind Moses, Tom Parrish, Addison Barrack and Montrell Williams, Chris Plummer, Ed.D, as well as the Adroit and Nashville Tools for Schools organizations. Their work continues to expand opportunities for young people by improving student outcomes and breaking down barriers to public education. Today also marked the first Public Schools Hall of Fame celebration led by Diarese George, Ed.D in his role as the Foundation's new President and CEO.

"This year's Public Schools Hall of Fame is a powerful reminder of what makes our district so remarkable," said **Dr. George**. "Our honorees have helped open doors for students and created lasting opportunities for their learning and growth. I am especially honored to be part of this event in my first year as President and CEO of the Foundation and to witness firsthand the excellence, collaboration and innovation that fuel our schools. Events like this show how, together, we can empower every student to reach their full potential."

The 21st annual Public Schools Hall of Fame, presented by First Horizon Foundation for the eighth year, brought together more than **700** attendees at the Music City Center in downtown Nashville. Guests included Nashville Mayor Freddie O'Connell, MNPS Superintendent Dr. Adrienne Battle, Metropolitan Nashville Council members, members of the Tennessee General Assembly, Metropolitan Nashville Board of Public Education representatives, and leaders from across the mid-state's business and civic community. The event also featured a special performance of "I Belong," an original song created and performed by MNPS student artists as part of the MNPS Songwriting Summit.

"We're deeply grateful to the Nashville Public Education Foundation for spotlighting the community partners, educators, and alumni who have made a profound impact on Nashville's students and families through education, service, and innovation," said **Dr. Battle.** "This year's nine honorees, just like our outstanding student performers, showcase the remarkable talent and dedication within our district, and it's inspiring to see how they advance our mission of making Every Student Known. We know we can't do this work alone, and we appreciate everything our partners contribute year after year."

- Martesha Johnson Moore, Nashville Metropolitan Chief Public Defender and graduate of Whites Creek High School.
- Marlene Eskind Moses, internationally recognized family law attorney at GSRM Law and graduate of Hillsboro High School.
- **Tom Parrish**, Chief Operating Officer of the Scarlett Family Foundation and graduate of Hillwood High School, now known as James Lawson High School.

Annette Eskind Inspiring Educator Award presented by UBS

- Addison Barrack, a Students with Interrupted Formal Education (SIFE) educator at Antioch High School.
- Montrell Williams, an Integrated Mathematics 1 teacher at Whites Creek High School.

Thomas J. Sherrard Inspiring Innovation Award presented by Nissan

- Adroit, an organization dedicated to expanding equitable access to STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) education for students of all backgrounds.
- <u>Nashville Tools for Schools</u>, an organization working to "build for our children's future" by building custom furniture, shelving and storage cabinets, and outdoor items for MNPS schools.

This year's celebration was grounded in the power of public education and highlighted the community's ongoing commitment to advancing outcomes and opportunities for all students.
