Nashville Honors 25 New Blue Ribbon Teachers for Excellence in Student Success, Instruction and Leadership

Honorees awarded with \$2,000 cash prize and surprise roundtrip Southwest Airlines vouchers

NASHVILLE, TENN. — Nov. 3, 2025 -

Metro Nashville Public Schools (MNPS) and Nashville Public Education Foundation (NPEF) designated 25 educators as new Blue Ribbon Teachers at a ceremony hosted by Vanderbilt University on October 30. Each Blue Ribbon teacher received a \$2,000 cash prize, professional headshots, a trophy, media mentions and two round-trip airline tickets, courtesy of Southwest Airlines. Since 2014, the Blue Ribbon Teacher awards have recognized and celebrated more than 475 of Nashville's top teachers.



Joined by Nashville Mayor Freddie O'Connell, MNPS Superintendent Dr. Adrienne Battle and other elected officials, the 11th annual Blue Ribbon Teacher ceremony recognized MNPS educators for their exemplary work in their classrooms and communities. Honorees were selected in the following categories: Excellence in Student Success and Opportunity, Excellence in Instruction, and Excellence in Leadership.

Eligible Blue Ribbon Teacher <u>candidates</u> must be full time MNPS teachers for at least four years, have a strong Level of Effectiveness of their performance in the last three consecutive years, and be endorsed by their principals. Winners are determined by a rigorous selection process that includes a review of application materials and evidence by a community panel.

As part of NPEF's continued investment in educator innovation and professional learning opportunities, applications are now open for the fifth <u>Teacherpreneur cohort</u>. The program invites Nashville public school-certificated, non-administrative educators – including teachers, counselors, librarians and others working directly with students – to bring their ideas for change to life. Through a series of collaborative sessions beginning in early 2026, participants will refine their concepts and prepare to pitch for a share of \$25,000 in cash prizes awarded to the top teacher-led innovations.
